

What is scripture mapping?



Scripture mapping is a method of Bible study, but for me it is specifically writing out the Bible by hand. This approach helps me to think about or pay attention to the words in a new way. Sometimes my eyes can start skimming or, if I'm tired, I find myself rereading a paragraph without much understanding. Writing it out with pen and paper engages my body, mind, and soul all at once.

Recommendations:

- Use a specific journal only for scripture mapping so that you can follow your progress and notice connections through your entries.
 You may be surprised how meaningful and encouraging this can be!
- The key to making this a regular practice is to keep it easy and enjoyable. I like to focus on no more than one chapter per week so that my hand doesn't get tired and so I really consider what that chapter had to say. If you run, for example, you know it's important you find your own pace and rhythm with breathing as well as your feet on the pavement. The process is more important than the finish line.
- Optional online tools like www.biblegateway.com provides passages in different translations of the Bible, such as the NLT or NRSV.
 Other optional in-depth tools are online Bible concordance (for deeper word origin/meanings) or a Bible dictionary (defines Biblical terms). But again, these are optional. Don't stress it!
- Get artsy! I use a black pen, but I like to use size, shapes, arrows, and underlining as well as creating different fonts to bring my attention to certain words or sentences. Sometimes I even write the words in a shape. You can use multiple colored pens, stickers, etc!
- I enjoy pausing to pray or to write a note if something stands out to me. I just label it so I know it's a personal note when returning back to read through it. These journals are a gift that keeps on giving!

My note: There is a lot in this chapter about God's PLAN, the nature of our relationship with God, and how Christ is essential to both.

God's purpose:

My note:

In Christ there is no Jew/Gentile distinction, but rather the Holy Spirit identifies those who are Christ's.

The Spirit

is God's guarantee that:
